## A note for parents

This is the version you print, slide into a sheet protector, and let your younger kids use with a dry-erase marker. The goal is for them to feel ownership over their bag — that they did this, that the bag is theirs because they packed it.

The categories are simple on purpose. Six groups, each with space for them to mark off what they've put in. If they can't read yet, the icons carry the meaning.

When they finish, write or say it out loud: *You packed this. You're learning to take care of yourself.* That sentence does more for a six-year-old's confidence than any lecture about responsibility ever will.
