## The Bridge from Packing to Planning

Packing is the first place most kids encounter real-world prioritization, and the skill they build here turns out to be the same skill they'll use for travel planning, capsule wardrobes, shopping decisions, and eventually how they set up their first apartment. The five questions below are the bridge — the ones that connect the small skill of packing a bag to the larger skill of figuring out what matters and what doesn't in any other situation.

*Where are we going?* The destination shapes everything else. Skip this and the rest of the questions don't have anything to anchor to.

*What will we be doing?* The activities, not the dates, are what determine the contents.

*What do I actually need to carry?* Not what would be nice to have, not what I might use, but what I'll actually need.

*What can I share with someone else on this trip?* Toothpaste, sunscreen, chargers, books — the shared items are usually a surprising portion of any group packing list.

*What can I leave behind without missing it?* This is the question most people skip. The honest answer is usually *more than I think*.

These five questions, applied to packing, get you a leaner bag. Applied to closet organizing, they get you a wardrobe that works. Applied to shopping, they get you fewer impulse buys. Applied to a move into a first apartment, they get you a home that fits your life instead of one that overwhelms it.

The principle is portable. Once a kid learns it through packing, the rest of life starts looking different too.
